

#### Health Care: Medicare and Medicaid Providers

# Health Care: Persons Receiving Medicare

The total number of persons receiving Medicare is shown, broken down by number over 65 and number of disabled persons receiving Medicare for the 5 county report area in Table 76. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services reported that a total of 51,534 persons were receiving Medicare benefits in the report area in 2007. A large number of individuals in our society are aware that persons over 65 years of age receive Medicare; however, many of them are unaware that disabled persons also receive Medicare benefits. A total of 8,656 disabled persons in the report area received Medicare benefits in 2007. Northumberland County had the highest number (3,752) of Medicare recipients among disabled persons, while Montour County had the lowest number (571) of Medicare recipients among disabled persons.



## Health Care: Child Health Insurance Program (CHIP) Enrollment

Child Health Insurance Program (CHIP) enrollment is shown in Table 77. Total enrollment in the 5 county area is 3,904 children. The number of enrollees whose household income is no greater than 200 percent of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) totals 3,342, while those enrolled where FPL is greater than 300 percent equals 32 children.

Families who are at or above 200% of the Federal Poverty Level pay in part on a sliding scale for CHIP services.



## Health Care: Uninsured Population

The uninsured population is calculated by estimating the number of persons eligible for insurance (generally those under 65) minus the estimated number of insured persons. In 2010, the percentage of uninsured persons ranged from 10 percent in Montour County to 14 percent in Snyder County. Comparatively, the Pennsylvania rate was 12.1 percent and the national rate was 17.7 percent.



## Health Care: Prenatal Care

Prenatal care significantly factors into the health of pregnant women and the birth of healthy babies. In 2011, a total of 50 women did not receive prenatal care in the 5 County report area. The total number of women's first prenatal care visit occurring in the 1st trimester of pregnancy was 1,790; the total of first visits during the 2nd trimester was 575; and, for the 3rd trimester the total was 147 first time visits. Women's first prenatal care visit in an unknown trimester totaled 45 occurrences. There were 50 cases in which no prenatal care occurred.



#### Health Care: Births

Most live births occurred with mothers 20-30 years of age, giving birth to 59.33 percent of all births in the report area. The second largest group is mothers 30-40 years of age, with 30.36 percent of births. Mothers over age 40 represent 1.55 percent of births.

Of interest are live births by mothers under the age of 19, who gave birth to 8.10 percent of all babies in the report area. These births can work against families being self-sufficient. Teen mothers are statistically less likely to continue education through high school and college, without which many may earn only low-income wages. Teen mothers and their children face increased health risk due to lack of education and resources.



#### Health Care: Number of Deaths and Death Rate

Number of Deaths and Death Rates are shown in Table 81. Birth and total death crude rates are per a 1,000 person population, while infant and neonatal death rates are per 1,000 live births. (Neonatal death denoting death within one week of a live birth.) Fetal death rates are per 1,000 deliveries (live births + fetal deaths) and exclude induced terminations. (Fetal death refers to stillborn or death after a 20 week gestation period.)

Subtracting the crude death rate from the crude birth rate provides the rate of natural increase, which is equal to the rate of population change in the absence of migration. According to the Pennsylvania Department of Health, Bureau of Health Statistics and Research, there were a total of 2,579 live births in the 5 county area, compared to 2,766 total deaths and 27 infant deaths. The rate of natural increase in the report area during 2010 was -187 lives.










